E very Veteran's Day on November 11th, we pause to reflect on the heroism, honor and sacrifice of our nation's veterans who served our country and defended our freedom. Did you ever stop to consider that there are many veterans in the Bible? The Bible is packed with battle imagery and history of many mighty warriors who trusted God. The Bible tells of successful combats and battles where there was loss of life and great victory for God's people. Much like our soldiers today, they knew the full content of war. Here are just a few of the many Bible veterans:

<u>David</u>

1 Samuel 16:18 – "One of the servants answered, "I have seen a son of Jesse of Bethlehem who knows how to play the lyre. He is a brave man and a warrior. He speaks well and is a fine-looking man. And the LORD is with him."

David killed Goliath, champion of the Philistines, when David was only a youth and Goliath a giant and veteran warrior. David was victorious because he trusted in God for the victory, not himself. As an adult, David killed many of Israel's enemies in battle, wreaking havoc on his personal life. Often David cried out to God for help and forgiveness. Despite several opportunities, David refused to kill King Saul because he was God's first anointed king, who was pursuing David out of mad jealousy. He became friends, like brothers, with Saul's son Jonathan, setting a model of friendship that everyone can learn from.

<u>Joshua</u>

Deuteronomy 31:6 – "Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid or terrified because of them, for the LORD your God goes with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you."

As second in command to Moses when Israel left Egypt, he


led the army. He trusted God and yet experienced uncertainty and fear. When he took over the leadership at Moses death, God had to remind him to be strong and courageous several times. He listened to God and trusted God at his Word, however, we can see how even the strongest warrior can still be fearful and face great danger with God's promise to be with him.

<u>Gideon</u>

Judges 6:12 – "When the angel of the LORD appeared to Gideon, he said, "The LORD is with you, mighty warrior."

Even though Gideon's faith was weak, once convinced of God's power, he was a loyal follower who obeyed the Lord's instructions. The Bible says God called him to face a battle against outrageous odds, a fortified army with greater military prowess than Israel. He served as a judge over his people. He destroyed an altar to the pagan god Baal, earning the name Jerub-Baal, and meaning 'contender with Baal.' Gideon united the Israelites against their common enemies and through God's power, defeated them.

Our God understands the experience and feelings of all veterans, the battles they have fought, the loss of life they've witnessed, and the physical and emotional scars they may carry from times of great peril in serving our country. In the United States, we can accurately say our freedom and our existence comes first from God and then from the veterans He has called to defend that very freedom we cherish. If opportunity provides, let vets know you appreciate them this Veteran's Day and pray for them. They are God's soldiers by land, by sea, and by air, all seeking righteousness, protecting our homeland, and are instruments of His peace. God bless our veterans.

ow eagerly children await the promise of Christmas morning. The sight of toys, pretty packages, and bright colored bows tucked under the tree excite the hearts of children and adults on Christmas morning everywhere!

For most of us, it's not hard to describe a gift we may have opened Christmas morning. The gifts we give and receive are tangible, human gifts, created or manufactured by human hands or machines so they are easy to describe.

But how do we describe the gift of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ? Is it even possible? What words would we use to describe how and why a holy God willingly left His throne in heaven and came to earth, took on the flesh of a helpless baby, fully dependent upon his mother and father to feed Him, bathe Him, potty-train Him.

The Lord of Glory, the one who spoke "Let there be Light" now had to learn how to walk, a young little child who had to learn how to read and write yet was tempted in all points just like us yet never caved into sin.

He shed His precious blood, was beaten and abused, experienced excruciating pain and torture, separation from His Father, and suffered and died for us? How do we describe such a gift?

Our apostle Paul couldn't describe it

either when he wrote to the Corinthian church and referred to the gift of Christ to them - and to us today - by saying, "Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift." (2 Corinthians 9:15). Even Paul was at a loss for words in describing God's gift to us through Jesus, recognizing that there are no human words adequate to fully describe or understand what our Savior has done for us!

Yet, the message of Christmas is not about the gifts under the tree; rather, it is a reminder of the gift that God has given to each of us at the cross – eternal life in Christ - the only gift that truly keeps on giving . . . Forever!

When you want to give a loved one a special gift, normally you think about it ahead of time. You take into account the needs and wants of that special person who will be the recipient of your gift. In the same way, God made a decision before the foundation of the world (Rev. 13:8) that He would give us a gift we really needed - His only begotten Son to redeem us.

When you think about it, the gift of Jesus Christ does not depend on whether we are naughty or nice at Christmas or anytime of the year. The truth is we are all sinners and don't deserve this gift at all. Yet, God gave us the priceless gift of His Son when we were His enemies. That's mind blowing. The Bible tells us, "But God commendeth His love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8).

May the joy and peace that settles on you this Christmas season be a blessedness that lingers deep in your heart this Christmas and the coming New Year as we give thanks for God's indescribable gift of Jesus Christ.

Here in my warm stable, Some voices I could hear; Many people all around Someone was coming near.


Two came into my stable I head this couple say: "We're so thankful for this place." Then they laid down on the hay.
